

Chair's Report

2023 saw a continued year of exceptional growth for Southern Cross Soloists.

The Board for 2023, consisted of Chairperson Dr Di Khursandi and for an extended period Michael Byrom as Acting Interim Chair, member musicians Alan Smith, James Wannan, and Tania Frazer - Company Secretary and Artistic Director, and Peter Collins (Financial Director). The Board also welcomed new Director Rob Whiddon.



A requested succession plan by Chair Dr Di Khursandi due to ongoing

health issues presented an opportunity for myself to be invited to the Chair position in early 2024, which I readily accepted. I take this opportunity to thank the previous board for their stewardship. Particularly their careful management and due diligence during the COVID years.

We continue to make strong gains in audience and brand development, marketing and publicity with new regional endeavours and an inaugural recital series developed and delivered successfully in 2023 - the Sunset Soiree Recital Series. Both the 14th QPAC Concert Series (averaged audience attendance of 800 per concert) and the emerald anniversary edition of the much-loved 20th Bangalow Chamber Music Festival 2023 were very successful from audience numbers, and critical media response perspectives. The inaugural Sunset Soiree Recital Series shows promise to become a calendar highlight in future years with expansion to other regional spots top of mind for the Board and Management in 2024. The 10-year legacy project, the SXS Didgeridoo Commissioning Project 2022 - 2032 gains more attention and sees SXS well prepared with new Australian works each year in time for the Cultural Program of the 2032 Brisbane Olympics.

Queensland artists continued to shine in 2023 with new talent unearthed and their talent displayed to enthralled audiences. Our focus on First Nations cultural engagement and promotion was on show in 2023 and it is a continued priority for the ensemble.

The Board successfully addressed finances ending with a nominal negative amount on the budget balance for 2023. Self-sustainable business models and own revenue sourcing are top of mind priorities for the Board and Management. My thanks to the excellent budget keeping and systems in place and to Financial Director Peter Collins and Accounts Manager Cath Charrington. General Manager Maxine Williamson works closely with Finance and Accounts and Producer and Marketing Manager Nikhil Deo, for strong budget control across all projects for good governance and accountability. A successful donor drive continued throughout the year and in the second half of the year we saw our Soloists sponsored for the 2024 Season. Our generous donors ensured we go into 2024 as an extremely viable and valued ensemble, with an exciting series of great music and new Queensland artists to wow audiences in 2024. We continue to achieve high excellence in creative programming and delivery in music making although we are at administrative capacity within our administrative team. The SXS administrative team has worked closely with QPAC marketing and publicity to grow the 14th QPAC Concert Series which reached new audiences in 2023 with a 40% increase in patronage. Artistic Director Tania Frazer continues to program exceptional concerts to delight audiences along with finding new Queensland creative artists at the top of their game to wow audiences. We thank the Honourable Dame Quentin Bryce AD CVO for her continued patronage.

General Manager's Report

2023 was an extremely successful high output delivery year for Southern Cross Soloists. It was also a turning point for the company and a juncture to springboard our new strategic long-term plans. We continued our strategic focus on securing exceptional Queensland soloists returning home from studies overseas in the post-Covid world. One of our missions at SXS in 2023 and beyond is to create a brains trust of virtuosic Queensland talent that may

align with our three-decade successful brand in order to provide a performance and promotion platform so they may shine in Queensland. This state offers high calibre artists and SXS provides artist opportunities to avoid the dreaded 'brain drain' of artists exiting for work opportunities to southern states or overseas. We see SXS as an important conduit to providing ongoing creative employment opportunities to Queensland artists. SXS is all about virtuosity and I was thrilled to be able to spotlight numerous returning expat Queensland artists in 2023. We launched our inaugural Sunset Soiree Recital Series in 2023 and it was the first year of our strategic role out for regional expansion. The first stage of the regional network in 2023 was regional Gold Coast (Mudgeeraba) and Stanthorpe, with 2024 Stage 2 plans set to expand to new Queensland regional destinations. We are extremely proud of the continued evolution of our long legacy cultural project the Didgeridoo Commissioning Project 2022-2032. Its establishment sees SXS strongly positioned to showcase our virtuosity and First Nations culture and its ancient musical instrument to a world stage during the 2032 Cultural Olympiad. Its second year, three new hybrid Australian works were World Premiered by eminent artists and composers in a 50/50% collaboration with Wakka Wakka didgeridoo soloist and Chair of the Advisory Committee for DCP, Chris Williams. Our cultural protocols Wakka Wakka framework is led by First Nations Wakka Wakka Elder Professor Kevin Williams. Chris Williams received an Industry Placement funded program to pursue his ongoing leadership role as Chair of the DCP Advisory Committee. Through the support of our SXS International Ambassador Sean O'Boyle AM, 2023 DCP saw SXS work with eminent creatives; Australian trumpet legend James Morrison AM and Emmy award-winning, US multi-stringed instrumentalist, John Jorgenson. Through these associations, the DCP broadened into non classical genres which in turn broadened the audience appeal and generated record numbers in 2023 at QPAC. James Morrison AM has invited SXS to the prestigious UKARIA Residency Program in SA in 2024 and Queensland Ballet has invited SXS to participate in their inaugural First Nations Ballet - Bespoke Series - in 2024. The Sydney Mozart Society has also invited SXS to perform in 2024. The DCP project was also recorded in 2023 by ABC Classics with a roll-out of the CD set for 2024. Our QPAC concerts were also recorded by ABC Classics for their Lunchtime Concert series broadcast. In 2023, SXS was invited to perform our Maps and Journeys (First Nations Astronomy) project at the Melbourne Recital Centre with a Queensland Premiere of this fascinating project set for the short term and a US international tour as a longterm plan. SXS also performed an invited sell-out performance for the Sunshine Coast Chamber Music Festival 2023. This stellar year could not have been achieved without the due diligence of our exceptional Management Team with strong strategic and business leadership skills and the good governance of our Board of Directors. We continue to pursue selfsustainable own revenue finance models and remain in a strong financial position at the close of 2023. Our future business is to consolidate our Queensland business and artists to future proof for the 2032 Olympics in Brisbane. Maxine Williamson

Pursuit of excellence in the magical art of music making, connecting, and inspiring, a healthy, vibrant community, innovating, and creating new Australian works that highlight our First Nations culture, is at the heart of SXS, who are synonymous with delivering quality music in Australia and abroad.

Composed of leading soloists from across Australia, SXS creates and performs dynamic, unique, and world-class musical experiences for audiences of all ages. 2023 marked SXS 28th year of excellence in music making. SXS balances breathtaking virtuosity with vibrant storytelling and unique, considered artistic programming. Company in Residence at the pre-eminent cultural precinct in Brisbane, the Queensland Performing Arts Centre, SXS delivered in 2023, intoxicating virtuosity in its 14th QPAC Concert Series. Enjoying the privilege of strong patronage and critical success, SXS's repertoire continued to gain notoriety and reached new enthralled audiences of 800 attendees for each of the three QPAC concerts. Passionate exponents for new Australian music and renowned for fostering

international soloists and composers, SXS

has commissioned, to date, **over 180**World Premiere new works.

2023, saw the second year of the ten-year cultural legacy project, the **SXS**

Didgeridoo Commissioning Project 2022 - 2032 featuring three new works for didgeridoo and chamber music by Australian and international composers, each year.

In 2023 SXS successfully launched the NEW annual **Sunset Soiree Recital Series** to reimagine the intimate salon soirees of eons gone by.

SXS are committed cultural ambassadors through metropolitan and regional areas, and are dedicated educators and mentors, of the rising stars of chamber music. Through its flagship 10th SXS Next Gen Artists Program 2023 and 8th Margaret Schindler Vocal Scholarship 2023, SXS in 2023, continued to nurture some of Australia's most in-demand young musicians today.

The 20th Bangalow Chamber Music Festival 2023, owned, operated, and presented by SXS, was a resounding success and is a major event in the Australian arts calendar. Performing with Queensland, Australian and international artists and providing meaningful community outreach to regional NSW. 2023 saw the Victorian premiere at the Melbourne Recital Centre of SXS's Maps and Journeys: the world's first astronomers, exploring the astronomical knowledge of Australia's First Nations people. 2023 also saw a SXS sold out performance at the Sunshine Coast Chamber Music Festival. In 2023, SXS welcomed back Wakka

2023 was a year of immense growth for Southern Cross Soloists, in all areas including artists, management, fundraising and governance.

In 2023, SXS has:

- Extended the ground-breaking 10-year SXS
 Didgeridoo Commissioning Project 2022-2032, into
 cross hybrid art forms with each new Australian work a
 50/50 collaboration between composer and First
 Nations Wakka Wakka SXS didgeridoo soloist Chris
 Williams.
- Toured Maps and Journeys: The World's First
 Astronomers with Eric Avery, Paula Nazarski and Chris
 Williams to the Melbourne Recital Centre for its
 Victorian premiere.
- Showcased First Nations content in 90% of our live performances.
- Delivered a live-streamed workshop moderated by composer Lachlan Skipworth as a resource for composers to learn how to include didgeridoo in their compositions.
- Workshopped five pieces by young emerging composers for didgeridoo.
- Broadcast 2 concerts with ABC Classic FM with a weekly listenership of 781,000.
- Increased our Audience growth by 40% in 2023, with over 2300 audience attending our performances at QPAC (pre-Covid our annual audience numbers were 900 per annum).
- Offered 150 paid employment opportunities to musicians, artists and arts workers .
- Mentored eight emerging musicians through the SXS Next Gen Artists program.
- Mentored one emerging Queensland First Nations opera singer through the SXS Margaret Schindler Vocal Scholarship.
- Launched a new touring concert series: the SXS Sunset Soirée Recital Series in 2023.

- Extended our audience reach to new regional venues in Gold Coast hinterland Mudgeeraba, Stanthorpe and Sunshine Coast.
- Presented our QPAC 14th series in 2023 including three World Premieres; two with didgeridoo as the soloist.
- Presented four World Premiere works.
- Presented three new commissioned Australian works.
- SXS is highly experienced at delivering successful events, with 28 years of experience, a skilled management team and a qualified Board of Directors to oversee the governance and fiscal management of the company.
- Performed for a total of 3899 audience members over all activities for 2023.
- Presented 14 events at the 20th Bangalow Chamber Music Festival 2023.
- Received a second prestigious nomination for the 20th Bangalow Chamber Music Festival 2023 in the AMCOS APRA ART MUSIC AWARDS for Best Regional Event.
- Recorded four Didgeridoo Commissioning Project
 2022-2032 Australian new works with ABC Classic FM.
- Performed a sell-out concert, including a World
 Premiere commissioned new Australian work at the
 Sunshine Coast Chamber Music Festival.
- Established relationship with Arts Major Queensland Ballet for inaugural First Nations ballet collaboration between SXS and Queensland Ballet's BESPOKE Series 2024.
- Established relationship with Queensland Music Trails for collaborative opportunities in 2025.



KONSTANTIN SHAMRAY SXS Artist in Residence 2023

"SXS Artist in Residence 2023, Konstantin Shamray with his Nosferatian fingers was incredible. Ominously racing up and down scales and arpeggios as if the music was playing at double speed. The glossy Steinway piano lid enabled you to watch hundreds of hammers hitting the strings almost simultaneously. As the last notes faded into the starry night, the audience erupted into congratulatory applause, incredulous at witnessing such a supernatural skill, whilst Shamray bowed and stretched his tortured left hand with a smile of relief."

Didgeridoo Commissioning Project 2022 - 2032

The SXS Didgeridoo Commissioning Project (DCP) since announced in February 2022 has world premiered six new Australian works for didgeridoo and chamber ensemble. ABC Classic has recorded these new works in 2023 for digital release in 2024. The project has also delivered school performances and composer workshops in 2023. A media call was held in October 2023 to coincide with the Composer Workshop which included American Grammy award winner multi-stringed instrumentalist John Jorgenson and cultural advisor/consultant Prof. Kevin Williams.

Professor Seán O'Boyle AM

Awarded the Order of Australia in 2015 for services to music, Sean's compositions have been performed and/or recorded by all the major Australian orchestras. European Orchestras include; Berlin Philharmonic, Orchestre Symphonique Divertimento, Royal Philharmonic Orchestra, BBC Concert Orchestra, Belgrade Philharmonic Orchestra, and by North American orchestras including the Dallas, Atlanta, Tacoma, Lexington, Fort Worth Symphony Orchestras and the Cincinnati Pops Orchestra. Sean has written and produced music for more than 150 CDs recorded in collaboration with the Australian Broadcasting Corporation, numerous television shows, sporting events and for film. Sean is proud of his 25-year relationship with the SXS.



James Morrison AM

James Morrison is, by anybody's standard, a virtuoso in the true sense of the word. Besides the trumpet, this multi-instrumentalist also plays trombone, piano, saxophone and double bass. At the age of six he started on piano, at seven he took up brass, at nine he formed his first band and at thirteen he was playing professionally in nightclubs. His international career developed just as quickly with a debut in the USA at the Monterey Jazz Festival at age sixteen. Following this were performances at the world's major jazz festivals, including Montreux, North Sea, Nice and the Hollywood Bowl, playing with many of the legends of jazz - Dizzy Gillespie, Herbie Hancock, Dave Brubeck, Chick Corea, George Benson, Quincy Jones, Ray Charles, B.B. King, Ray Brown and Wynton Marsalis to name a few. James also frequents the world's most famous



John Jorgenson

Grammy award winning guitarist and multi-instrumentalist John Jorgenson is known for his blistering guitar and mandolin licks and mastery of a broad musical palette. His reputation as a world-class musician has been accomplished through his frequent collaborations with artists such Elton John, Tommy Emmanuel, The Byrds, Bob Dylan, Willie Nelson, Johnny Cash, Barbra Streisand, and Luciano Pavarotti. Jorgenson continues to expand his dynamic range of musical offerings, exploring new elements of world music, bluegrass, rock and classical. First coming to national attention in the mid '80s as co-founder of successful country-rock act The Desert Rose Band, an eclectic array of artists such as Bonnie Raitt, Bob Seger and Barbra were drawn to add Jorgenson's artistry to their own recordings. While a member of the Desert Rose Band, Jorgenson won the Academy of Country Music's "Guitarist of the Year" award two consecutive

Southern Cross Soloists entered the ABC Classic studios in 2023 under the guidance of ABC Producer Lucas Burns to produce and record the first four new composition works for didgeridoo and small ensemble as a part of the long legacy project, the SXS Didgeridoo Commissioning Project 2022 - 2032. SXS received an auspicious PPCA grant to record. Four tracks were laid with the recordings to be launched in 2024.

Didgeridoo Commissioning Project Education Tier 2022 - 2032

Parallel to the commissioning and performance deliverables, SXS established an Educational Tier to the SXS Didgeridoo Commissioning Project to nurture the next generation of composers as well as introducing school students to this unique cultural project.

The first iteration of this was the premiere and release of six free online composer workshop videos in February 2022, as a resource for composers to learn how to include didgeridoo in their compositions. This series is part of SXS's ongoing SXS Digital initiatives and activities. Live-streamed composer workshops were also held in 2022.

On 19 October 2023, SXS presented a simultaneously world live streamed Didgeridoo Composer Workshop in the Judith Wright Art Centre which included a QPAC led Media Call. This workshop allowed composers to submit works and have their pieces workshopped in real time and receive feedback from workshop moderator Australian esteemed composer Lachlan Skipworth. Didgeridoo soloist Chris Williams, American guitarist John Jorgenson, SXS musicians, and Cultural Consultant, First Nations Elder Professor Kevin Williams were in attendance and spoke with the attendees. Italian composer Denis Feletto was also in attendance. Elaine Seeto from Queensland Symphony Orchestra was a workshop attendee along with composers from across the country.

The aim of these workshops is to encourage and inform composers who wish to include the didgeridoo in their compositions and/or learn more about the didgeridoo's musical language as well as discussing the essential cultural protocols involved in collaborating with First Nation's artists.





The SXS Didgeridoo Commissioning Project 2022 - 2032 (DCP), took SXS on an excursion to Sunshine Coast schools which is an ongoing priority for the company. Following on from a successful dress rehearsal performance of Maps and Journeys: The World's First Astronomers, Immanuel Lutheran College (Buderim) hosted an engaging and interactive one hour Q&A and Workshop on the Didgeridoo and Indigenous storytelling through music. The event was attended by approximately 300 students and staff across five high schools in the region. First Nations' high calibre creatives conducting the Q&A and workshop were Paula Nazarski (actress), Eric Avery (violinist, composer) and Chris Williams (didgeridoo, composer, Chair of DCP Advisory Committee. The schools have requested an additional workshop in 2024 for DCP.

SUNSHINE COAST CHAMBER MUSIC FESTIVAL JUNE 9-11 2023

Southern Cross Soloists was invited to perform at the Sunshine Coast Chamber Music Festival to what was a sell-out concert. The program by SXS included the World Premiere performance of The Wise Woman, a part of SXS's Didgeridoo Commissioning Project 2022 - 2023.

"On the previous night at Beerwah Community Hall, the *Earth & Sky* event held its capacity audience spellbound with a sextet of musicians from Brisbane-based Southern Cross Soloists performing works that were, by turns, engaging, challenging, poignant and occasionally boisterous. True to its name, the SXS ensemble made space for its members to perform solo pieces, with James Wannan (viola), Tania Frazer (oboe), Courtney Cleary (violin), Guillaume Wang (cello) and Daniel Le (piano) delivering works from Massenet's evocative *Méditation* to Debussy's *Clair de lune* and Piazzolla's tango-inspired *Primavera*. It's said that a small ensemble can only be as good as its members and these players are very, very good. Main man at Beerwah, however, was didgeridoo master Chris Williams (also a highly regarded classical trumpeter) who delivered three sonorous works, including the world premiere of his composition *The Wise Woman* written in collaboration with renowned Australian composer Sean O'Boyle. This work pays tribute to Wakka Wakka Elder Maureen Williams whose passion for education blessed her with an extended family of well-qualified children and grandchildren, among them Chris Williams who holds a Masters Degree from London's Royal College of Music." 'Maps and Journeys: the world's first astronomers'

Held its Victorian premiere at the Melbourne Recital Centre in early 2023. The program explored the rich astronomical traditions and extraordinary navigational abilities of our First Nations people over the past 65,000 years, a culture of astronomical traditions believed by experts to be the oldest in the world. The project featured new works by First Nations composers Brenda Gifford and Eric Avery, working alongside didgeridoo soloist Chris Williams (Wakka Wakka people), vocalist and violinist Eric Avery, Actor/writer Paula Nazarski (Ngugi Woman from North Stradbroke Island), composer Sean O'Boyle, SXS AD Tania Frazer and SXS musicians. The premiere has visual elements projected on screen.



MARGARGET SCHINDLER VOCAL SCHOLARSHIP



The recipient receives lessons throughout the year plus performance opportunities through a variety of SXS's annual activities, including at the Bangalow Chamber Music Festival.

She received her Bachelor of Music Performance from the Queensland Conservatorium Griffith University before heading to London to undertake the Master of Arts studies at Royal Academy of Music in London from which she graduated with Distinction in 2022.

Since her participation in 2023 BCMF, Nina has now been engaged with Opera Australia, Victorian Opera, and has continued her participation with Opera Queensland's Young Artist Programme as well the Melba Opera Trust.
