Since 1995, SXS have firmly established themselves as one of Australia's preeminent classical music ensembles. Championing chamber music globally and nationally, SXS, each year, continue to reach new heights. The collaborative nature of the ensemble and its creative direction, ensures a commitment and desire to form long-lasting, diverse cultural partnerships with Australia's and, the world's, most notable musicians, and composers.

Pursuit of excellence in the magical art of music making, connecting, and inspiring, a healthy, vibrant community, innovating, and creating new Australian works, is at the heart of SXS, who are synonymous with delivering quality music in Australia and abroad.

Composed of leading soloists from across Australia, SXS creates and performs dynamic, unique, and world-class musical experiences for audiences of all ages. 2022 marked SXS's 27th year of excellence in music making. SXS balances breathtaking virtuosity with vibrant storytelling and unique, considered artistic programming.

Company in Residence at the preeminent cultural precinct in Brisbane, the Queensland Performing Arts Centre, SXS delivered in 2022, intoxicating virtuosity in its **13th QPAC Concert Series**.

Enjoying the privilege of strong patronage and critical success, SXS performed in standard mode at QPAC as its repertoire continues to gain notoriety and reaches new enthralled audiences of 600 attendees for each of the three concerts.

Passionate exponents for commissioning new Australian music and renowned for fostering creative partnerships with leading international soloists and composers, SXS has commissioned, to date, over 160 World Premiere new works.

February 2022 saw the pivotal announcement of the ten-year cultural legacy project, the SXS Didgeridoo Commissioning Project 2022 - 2023 featuring three new works for

didgeridoo and chamber music by Australian composers, each year.

SXS are committed cultural ambassadors through metropolitan and regional areas, and are dedicated educators and mentors, of the rising stars of chamber music.

Through its flagship SXS Next Gen Artists Program and Margaret Schindler Vocal Scholarship, SXS nurtures some of Australia's most in-demand young musicians today.

The 19th Bangalow Music Festival 2022, owned, operated, and presented by Southern Cross Soloists, was a resounding success and is s a major event in the Australian arts calendar. Performing with Australian and international artists and providing meaningful community outreach to regional NSW. 2022 saw the world premiere of the *Maps and Journeys:* the world's first astronomers, exploring the astronomical knowledge of Australia's First Nation's people.

In 2022, SXS welcomed didgeridoo soloist Chris Williams to continue as SXS's permanent Artist in Residence and enthusiastically welcomed back world-acclaimed, award-winning pianist Konstantin Shamray as 2022 SXS Artist in Residence.

Chair's Report

2022 has been a careful and prudent management year, not only for SXS, but for all performing artists managing in a COVID-19 world.

The year continued to see disruptions with artist replacements due to border restrictions. The Board, consisting of myself as Chair, Alan Smith, James Wannan (both members of the Soloists), Michael Byrom, and Peter Collins (financial director), with our Artistic Director Tania Frazer have had a busy year, nonetheless.

We have made strong gains in our brand development, marketing and publicity and we see the fruits of this labour in our audience numbers for our QPAC concerts and Bangalow Music Festival. Both the 13th QPAC Concert Series and the 19th Bangalow Music Festival were successful from audience numbers, revenue, and critical media response perspectives.

We managed to successfully address finances over the year, ending with a small negative amount on the budget balance for 2022. My thanks go to all members of the team for this outcome, especially our financial director Peter Collins. Maxine Williamson our General Manager, has worked extremely hard with the assistance of our Producer and Marketing Manager Nikhil Deo, who graduated from the Griffith Conservatorium this year. Strong budget control across all the projects is assisting tremendously with our governance and accountability. We said a sad farewell to Jonathan Henderson, our core flute artist, who was also managing our website. Nikhil Deo has taken up the website role. We continue to achieve excellence in music making although we are at administrative capacity within our administrative team with reduced Arts funding.

Highlights for 2022 were the announcement of our 10-year legacy project the SXS Didgeridoo Commissioning Project which sees us well prepared with new Australian works in time for the Cultural Program of the 2032 Brisbane Olympics. We have also enjoyed the patronage of Phil Brown, Arts Editor Courier Mail and Sunday Mail who has supported the SXS and Bangalow Music Festival with exceptional media coverage throughout the year. The SXS administrative team has worked closely with QPAC marketing to promote the QPAC Concert Series in standard mode to reach new audiences. Our Artistic Director Tania Frazer continues to program exceptional concerts to enthral audiences and is always seeking to find fresh, new creative artists at the top of their game to wow Queensland audiences.

A successful donor drive continued throughout the year and in the second half of the year we saw all our soloists sponsored for the 2023 Season. Our generous donors ensured we go into the next year as an extremely viable and valued ensemble, with an exciting series of great music in 2023.

Artistic Director's Report

2022 witnessed remarkable expansion for Southern Cross Soloists as a company across multiple fronts, positioning the company for immense growth over the next 10-year period. This encompassed substantial advancements in audience reach and ticket sales and a comprehensive focus on organisational and artistic enhancement, laying a solid foundation for further development and successes in both the short- and long-term futures.

2022 marked the first year that SXS has not received operational funding from Arts Qld, which resulted in having to work with a

reduced budget. However, despite these constraints, we have managed to not only maintain our operations but to turn 2022 into a major year of growth and long-term strategic planning for the company to take it into the next 10 years.

The first year since 2019 without any interruptions due to the COVID-19 pandemic, 2022 has allowed us to focus on delivering world class live performances, educational activities and community engagement events.

One of the highlights of the year was the successful launch our ground-breaking SXS Didgeridoo Commissioning Project (DCP), which garnered significant national coverage. This project holds a special place in Australia as the first of its kind, and it received widespread attention and recognition from national media including TV News outlets and major newspaper editorial. The project involved the collaboration of three composers and SXS Didgeridoo Soloist in Residence Chris Williams to create innovative and unique chamber music works with a distinctly Australian essence. The 10-year project aims to create a canon of didgeridoo and Schamber ensemble works to showcase to the world when Brisbane hosts Olympic Games in 2032.

Essential to the DCP was the establishment of the DCP Advisory Executive Committee, consisting of Wakka Wakka musician Chris Williams, Wakka Wakka elder Uncle Kevin Wirra Williams, international composer and SXS Ambassador Sean O'Boyle OA and myself. The committee plays a crucial role for guiding the DCP's activities and observing all cultural protocols. With this leadership, we secured grants from the Australia Council for the Didgeridoo Project new commissions, educational workshops and recording the new works in collaboration with ABC Classics. These grants have enabled us to bring our vision to life and share our artistic endeavours with a wider audience.

Another major achievement was the world premiere of our Maps and Journeys: the world's first astronomer production, which explores Australia's First Nation's 65,00 years of astronomical knowledge and practices. The show featured 17 new works in collaboration with four First Nations creatives: Chris Williams, violinist/composer Eric Avery, actor Paula Nazarski and composer Brenda Gifford.

Thanks to the generous grant received from Festival's Australia, this Maps and Journeys has become a significant investment initiative as an ongoing touring production with a multi-year lifespan and significant public interest. We aim to establish Maps and Journeys as a flagship program that showcases the diversity and richness of Australian music and culture both nationally and internationally over the next few years.

Artistically, SXS delivered an impressive line-up of artists and programs in 2022, including our 2022 Artist in Residence, internationally renowned piano soloist Konstantin Shamray and recently returned artists from overseas (due to the pandemic), offering them quality performance platforms as well as invaluable promotion and branding opportunities to support their careers and contribute to the revitalization of the arts sector in the post-pandemic era.

Through this collaboration of SXS's core musicians, First Nations artists, and international guest soloists, we are determined to maintain a high level of artistic excellence and deliver exceptional performances that resonate with audiences worldwide.

Our management team and Board of Directors have remained secure throughout the year, allowing us to focus on strategic planning, philanthropic engagement and good governance to achieve our company goals.

General Manager Maxine Williamson has 20 years plus multi-skilled experience as an arts leader within Brisbane, Australia and the international communities, and recent Qld Conservatorium of Music graduate, Nikhil Deo brought his own unique skillset to the team. Nikhil received on the job training throughout the year to develop his skills in Production and Marketing, particularly with regards to delivering a world class music festival and the QPAC subscription series. SXS is committed to long term development and up skilling of Deo's role to ensure Queensland has a robust, capable producer in the arts market, as well as upskilling other music graduates in arts management to offer them employment opportunities in their chosen profession.

The strength of the management team resulted in the successful delivery of the 2022 Bangalow Music Festival, marking our first festival since the pandemic as well as creating outstanding growth in our QPAC audience numbers. The impressive artistic quality of the 2022 program garnered increased media attention, which has further enhanced our visibility and reputation nationwide.

Looking forward, we are committed to a year of growth and strategic planning in preparation for the next ten years. Our focus will be on expanding our Didgeridoo Commissioning project with its connected educational outcomes and workshops.

Our partnership to deliver Contra Concerts as our regional touring project was highly successful and lay strong foundations to continue to develop our regional activities into 2023 and beyond to continue to bring our music to diverse communities throughout Queensland and Australia.

Overall, in 2022, our organisation focused strategically on building a solid foundation for the company to thrive and grow over the next ten years. We are actively developing and launching our ten-year strategy, which encompasses areas such as preparing for the 2032 Olympics, expanding our regional touring locations, developing attractive educational initiatives in response to community needs, and upskilling and establishing a highly experienced management team with an eye on delivering our long-term strategic goals as a small arts company.

2022, a year of growth for SXS

2022 was a year of immense growth for Southern Cross Soloists, in all areas including artists, management, fundraising and governance.

In 2022, SXS has:

- Launched the ground-breaking 10-year SXS
 Didgeridoo Commissioning Project, including 6
 new Australian commissions for the QPAC Series to date with a 50/50 collaborative artistic input from Chris Williams
- Presented 17 new Australian works featuring the didgeridoo and First Nations violin soloist, Eric Avery at our festival in Bangalow including 4 by First Nation's composers
- 6 performances of Maps and Journeys: The World's First Astronomers with Eric Avery, Paula Nazarski and Chris Williams
- Showcased First Nations content in 90% of our live performances
- Released six free online workshop videos as a resource for composers to learn how to include didgeridoo in their compositions
- 6 First Nation's events at the 2022 Bangalow Music Festival including two school concerts and three Q&A events
- Presented 4 open rehearsals and Q&A at UQ School of Music
- Presented a live and simultaneously streamed Didgeridoo Composer Workshop, including over 200 views from all over the world in partnership with QPAC
- Workshopped five pieces by young emerging composers for didgeridoo
- Broadcast 2 concerts with ABC Classics FM
- Broadcast 4 concerts with Australian Digital Concert Hall

- Increased our 100% Audience growth by 100% in 2022, with over 1800 audience attending our performances at QPAC (pre-Covid our annual audience numbers were 900 per annum)
- offered 128 paid employment opportunities to musicians, artists and arts workers
- mentored 8 emerging musicians through the SXS Next Gen Artists program
- mentored one emerging opera singer through the SXS Margaret Schindler Vocal Scholarship
- Umbrellaed a new regional touring concert series:
 Contra Concerts, which has now evolved into the
 SXS Sunset Soiree Series in 2023
- Extended our audience reach to new regional venues in Toowoomba, Stanthorpe, Warwick and Caloundra
- Presented our QPAC 13th series in 2022 including 3 World Premieres, all with didgeridoo as the soloist
- Presented 20 New work commissions
- Presented 28 works by Australian composers
- Presented 4 live streamed concerts
- SXS is highly experienced at delivering successful events, with 28 years of experience, a skilled management team and a qualified Board of Directors to oversee the governance and fiscal management of the series.
- Performed for a total of 5795 audience members over all activities for 2022
- Presented 14 events at the 2022 Bangalow Music Festival



Sean O'Boyle AM

Awarded the Order of Australia in 2015 for services to music, Sean's compositions have been performed and/or recorded by all the major Australian orchestras. European Orchestras include; Berlin Philharmonic, Orchestre Symphonique Divertimento, Royal Philharmonic Orchestra, BBC Concert Orchestra, Belgrade Philharmonic Orchestra, and by North American orchestras including the Dallas, Atlanta, Tacoma, Lexington, Fort Worth Symphony Orchestras and the Cincinnati Pops Orchestra. Sean has written and produced music for more than 150 CDs recorded in collaboration with the Australian Broadcasting Corporation, numerous television shows, sporting events and for film. Sean is proud of his 25-year relationship with the Southern Cross Soloists.



Leah Curtis

Leah Curtis scored the acclaimed Sundance thriller 'Killing Ground', praised as a "first rate score" (Variety). Awarded a Fulbright, and former visiting film composer at USC SMPTV, her music has received nominations from APRA, seven from the HMMA, with wins for Kuwaiti war film 'To Rest in Peace' and historical epic 'Exitus Roma', across best score and song. Her work has been featured in marquee festivals in Dubai, Cannes, New York and at the Aspen Music Festival where she studied over a summer with Oscar winning composer John Corigliano (The Red Violin). She works out of Los Angeles and internationally, writing, orchestrating and recording music for international cinema and the concert hall.



Matthew Dewey

Matthew Dewey is a composer and music director based in Sydney and Hobart in Australia. He composes powerful, lyrical music for the concert hall, the theatre and for film. His first chamber opera was written and staged when he was just 18 and at the age of 24, his first symphony and first orchestral suite were recorded in Moscow by the Russian Philharmonic Orchestra. In addition to his work as a freelance composer, Matthew is the music director of Australia's national classical music radio network, ABC Classic FM. Matthew's compositions have been commissioned and perform Chatterton" (2005); and released two full albums to date.



SXS Digital and Didgeridoo Composition Workshop

Parallel to the commissioning and performance deliverables, SXS has created an Educational Tier to the project to nurture the next generation of composers as well as introducing school students to this unique project.

The first part of this was the premiere and release six free online composer workshop videos in February 2022, as a resource for composers to learn how to include didgeridoo in their compositions. This series is part of SXS's ongoing SXS Digital initiatives and activities.

In September 2022, SXS presented a live and simultaneously streamed Didgeridoo Composer Workshop in partnership with QPAC, including

The Bangalow Music Festival, presented by the **Southern Cross Soloists (SXS)**, is a world-class classical music festival in regional NSW. A platform for artistic excellence in chamber music, the festival presents the highest calibre of professional musicians from across Australia and the globe to Australian audiences.

The festival has been a catalyst for premiering new and innovative Australian works; promoting interactive educational programs for students and emerging artists; and offering opportunities to local amateur and professional musicians to perform at the Festival Prelude (Local's Night). Sought after as an environment suited to fostering artistic excellence, Bangalow's beautiful hinterland setting provides inspiration for creativity. The range of venues available in Bangalow, with its intimate galleries, coffee houses and heritage venues, not only affords audiences and artists a unique festival experience, but also strengthens community involvement in the spirit of the event.

The Bangalow Music Festival plays a vital role in the cultural life of the region, particularly for the township itself. It provides tourist dollars and economic vitality through winter months by

attracting a national audience of music lovers to the region and assists in the ongoing promotion of the region as a holiday destination. Paramount to the success of the festival has been the close media relationship with The Bangalow Herald, who take an active role in maximising the benefits the festival brings to the township. Many local businesses contribute to and benefit from the festival weekend of activity, and these economic benefits are mutually recognised between all stakeholders. Two festival editions were cancelled due to the world pandemic covid-19. The 2020 and 2021 editions did not proceed. The 2022 19th edition of the festival was therefore managed very carefully to ensure a creative and critical success but also a financial profit had to be achieved.

In 2023, the festival will be 20 years old, which is a significant achievement. Based on the success of the 2022 19th festival, with a developing robust program, record ticket sales and patronage, the festival's growth in the region is assured. The branding for the 20th edition will include Chamber in the title. The 20th Bangalow Chamber Music Festival, will be held August 17 - August 20, 2023.

'Maps and Journeys: the world's first astronomers' set to premiere at the 2021 Bangalow Music Festival, received its World Premiere at the 19th BMF 2022 Festival. The program explored the rich astronomical traditions and extraordinary navigational abilities of our First Nations people over the past 65,000 years, a culture of astronomical traditions believed by experts to be the oldest in the world. The project featured new works by First Nations composers Brenda Gifford and Eric Avery, working alongside didgeridoo soloist Chris Williams (Wakka Wakka people), Actor/writer Paula Nazarski (Ngugi Woman from North Stradbroke Island), composer Sean O'Boyle, SXS AD Tania Frazer and SXS musicians and Next Gen artists. The World Premiere received an enthusiastic three-minute standing ovation from an enthralled full house.

CONTRA

Classic quartets in dynamic contrast.

In a recital of dynamic contrast, the striking shift between Mozart and Peter Sculthorpe's music is intended to shock the senses. Side by side, their juxtaposition assists to emphasise the opposing sound worlds of these two masterful composers.

The pleasure of Mozart's full quartet is suddenly paired back to a restrained instrumentation of solo violin, and solo cello. Within these solitary mediums, Sculthorpe paints with music. The imagery is evocative and playful with melancholic undertones. Aesthetic differences aside, Sculthorpe, like Mozart, is driven by melody. By placing Sculthorpe's works within the familiar territory that Mozart 's quartets offer, my hope is that the listener will be at ease and primed to receive Sculthorpe's music, and to enjoy each work with equal pleasure.

In an evocative hour of up-close, exotic art-song, cumulatively these compositions and their texts draw on evocative elements of nature and night to reconcile with raw emotion. Aromatic, sensual, mysterious and existential adventures are depicted in highly programmatic, sensitive music by Schubert, Sculthorpe and Ravel.

Often their music is delicate, with fragile, transparent textures regaling cool, moonlit scenes. Their songs depict nocturnal birds, dried flowers and sweet-smelling herbs. Beneath the moon and a sky full of stars, swirling seas and cool evening winds set the scene for hymns, ceremonies and erotic rendezvous. At their climax however, dramatic and expressive peaks remind us of the power of nature, as we are humbled by the monumental grandeur of towering mountains and vast cosmic planes.
