standard mode at QPAC as its repertoire continues to gain notoriety and reaches new enthralled audiences.

Passionate exponents for commissioning new Australian music and renowned for fostering creative partnerships with leading international soloists and composers, SXS has commissioned, to date, over 120

World Premiere new works. 2022 is no different with the announcement of the SXS Didgeridoo Commissioning

Project featuring three Australian composers, and a highlight of the 2022 QPAC Concert Series.

SXS are committed cultural ambassadors through metropolitan and regional areas, and are dedicated educators and mentors, of the rising stars of chamber music. Through its flagship SXS Next Gen Artists Program, SXS nurtures some of Australia's most in-demand young musicians today. The 19th Bangalow Music Festival 2022, owned, operated, and presented by Southern Cross Soloists, is a major event in the Australian arts calendar. Performing with Australian and international artists and providing meaningful community outreach to regional NSW.

In 2022, SXS welcomes didgeridoo soloist Chris Williams to continue as SXS's permanent Artist in Residence and enthusiastically welcomes world-acclaimed, award-winning pianist Konstantin Shamray as 2022 SXS Artist in Residence.

Chair's Report

2021 has been yet another turbulent year, not only for SXS, but for all performing artists managing in a COVID-19 world.

The Board, consisting of myself as Chair, Alan Smith, James Wannan (both members of the Soloists), Michael Byrom, our lawyer, and Peter Collins (financial director), with our Artistic Director, soloist Tania Frazer had a busy year, nonetheless.

COVID-19 continued to have unprecedented effects on communities in Old and Australia including on creative and cultural activity.

With a 26-year history of artistic excellence, SXS is one of Queensland's

most acclaimed and celebrated chamber music ensembles with an outstanding national profile and presence.

Our Board and artists have spent much time over the past 18 months reimagining the needs of the Queensland arts sector, both in terms of the audiences, the artists and arts workers, to strategically plan a path forward for SXS which benefits the company long-term, as a strategic vision for the next 10 years.

Part of our new pathway forward for 2021 was our commitment to reactivating live performance in Queensland, with an evolved program that takes current restrictions into consideration, using them as a new source of inspiration and guidance for the needs of the people of Queensland and the sector. We also aimed to design new programs which responded to the needs of Queensland, including building confidence amongst audiences and consumers, and creating vital employment opportunities for freelance artists and workers in the arts sector, who have been the hardest hit from lockdowns.

Personnel

Laura Coutts our manager, left us in mid 2021. After a temporary manager Joumanna Haddad worked with us for a few months, we were able to appoint Maxine Williamson to a permanent part time position as manager, and Nikhil Deos for marketing and production. Both of whom have been excellent and assiduous in their work; we owe them a great debt of thanks. Tania Frazer continues as our brilliant and inspirational artistic director.

A successful donor drive in the second half of the year saw all our soloists being sponsored. Our generous donors ensured we went into 2022 as an extremely viable and valued ensemble, with an exciting series of great music planned.

Our 2021 outcomes and proposed 2022-2023 activities and programs will also contribute to:

- Rebuilding the Queensland economy and the arts sector.
- Enhancing community wellbeing.
- Increasing access to cultural experiences across regional Queensland.
- Assisting in the presentation of First Nation's collaborative creative projects, specifically the Didgeridoo Commissioning Project.
- Offering mentoring and performance training opportunities to emerging artists, who have also had their careers stalled due to Covid restrictions.

SXS is a Queensland ensemble of virtuoso soloists who are committed to presenting world class performances to Queensland audiences. Audiences are gifted the experience of an up-close connection with the performers and a rare insight into their unique artistry, unlike regular orchestra and chamber orchestra performances.

Southern Cross Soloists' programs and repertoire are completely unique to the ensemble. Every program is carefully curated and bespoke repertoire created through our team of musicians, composers, arrangers and guest artists.

Artistic Director's Report

After the challenges of 2020, SXS was looking forward to a return to normal in 2021. However, as we all know now, this wasn't how things panned out for 2021.

Despite these significant challenges, Southern Cross Soloists still had an extremely successful 2021 season, with many outstanding artistic highlights, new partnerships and creating substantial groundwork for exciting long-term projects, particularly in the cross-cultural and First Nation's sphere.

Our 2021 QPAC Season started with a record-breaking concert featuring guest soloist Slava Grigoryan. The concert (that was originally postponed from 2020) attracted an audience of 900, a record figure for SXS at QPAC. This prompted us to perform the concert in full mode, as opposed to our regular reverse/intimate mode, and led the way for us to perform all our concerts at QPAC this way for the first time since our QPAC residency started in 2010.

The sudden Covid shutdowns and border closures in July and August 2021 directly affected our mid-year programs. Our July QPAC concert was postponed to September and unfortunately our 2021 Bangalow Music Festival had to be cancelled only 4 weeks out from the event. This was disappointing and financially challenging as the festival had already incurred expenses that were unable to be recovered, such as marketing, PR campaigns and some flight expenses.

We were fortunate that it was again possible to perform from September 2021, and we presented two highly successful concerts at QPAC, two performances at the new HOTA Art Gallery at the Gold Coast and two SXS Next Gen concerts in Brisbane.

A major highlight was the world premiere performance of a new work by Joseph Twist for Didgeridoo and SXS, inspired by the paintings of Springbrook National Park by William Robinson and featuring SXS's Didgeridoo Artist in Residence, Chris Williams. The world premiere performance received a **5-star review from Limelight Magazine** and was performed at the William Robinson exhibition at the HOTA Art Gallery.

In preparation for the Bangalow Music Festival, extensive workshops were completed for our First Nation's astronomy project titled: Maps and Journeys: The world's first astronomers. Although the performances of this event had to be postponed to Bangalow 2022, the workshops with First Nation's creatives Eric Avery, Brenda Gifford, Paula Nazarski, and Chris Williams alongside guidance from First Nation's aboriginal astronomy expert, Karlie Noon, were incredibly productive. New works by First Nation's composers were

workshopped by the SXS core musicians and the SXS Next Gen Artists performing alongside Chris Williams, Eric Avery and Paula Nazarski, with composition guidance from Sean O'Boyle and our assistant scribes Jordon He and Touki Wood.

The success of our new works written for solo Didgeridoo and SXS launched an exciting project to increase the canon of works for this combination. As a result, SXS filmed a **Didgeridoo workshop for composers** as

part of the SXS Digital initiative. This series of videos are being released on YouTube to be easily available tools for Australian composers to reference as part of learning more about including the didgeridoo in new Australian works. The initiative has now launched into the **SXS Didgeridoo**

Commissioning Project that is committed to creating a new canon of distinctly Australian works that showcase the didgeridoo in preparation for 2032, when Brisbane takes to the world stage as the host of the **2032 Olympic Games**. This is now a major focus for SXS as a company going forward.

Despite the many challenges of 2021, SXS was able to nimbly pivot to quickly reimagine activities within the necessary Covid restrictions. **SXS was also able to offer financial support to our colleagues from other Qld small arts companies.** We were able to offer paid employment to musicians from the Camerata, The Orava Quartet and Ensemble Q who had lost substantial performance income from their own cancelled events.


Our Board and management team worked tirelessly to guarantee a positive outcome for the company, despite Covid issues. This was definitely achieved, with an excellent financial outcome for the year as well as achieving a substantially increased audience base, an increase in our geographical reach to both Regional Old (Contra Concerts) and via digital channels nationwide, and ongoing creative projects showcasing the richness of our First Nation's valuable culture.



12th SXS QPAC CONCERT SERIES 2021

Southern Cross Soloists (SXS) continued their residency at the Queensland Performing Arts Centre in 2021, as Company in Residence. The ensemble presented its well-regarded Subscription 12th QPAC Concert Series in the iconic QPAC Concert Hall, where the refined acoustics perfectly suit the ensemble.

QPAC has provided generous assistance to Southern Cross Soloists, including office and rehearsal space, production management, and publicity, among other benefits. This has allowed the small SXS administrative team to run the office in a more efficient manner.

The opportunity to perform regularly in the QPAC Concert Hall has inspired the members of the ensemble to aim for new levels in their performance standards. The provision of technical production teams and an increased budget allocation for guest artist fees has seen the group expand its repertoire, and furthered its ability to collaborate with a wider range of musicians.

Moving from Reverse Mode to Standard Mode is indicative of the audience growth period SXS experiencing.

The Soloists thanks QPAC for their continuous support and assistance, and looks forward to further developing this partnership.







"Composer Joe Twist, was commissioned to compose The Ancient Rainforest. It was inspired by the song of the butcher bird outside his West End apartment window and by the giant paintings of the Queensland rainforest at Springbrook by William Robinson.

He encapsulated the mystery of the ancient forest in a musical portrait using the mystical, guttural sound of the didgeridoo, played by Artist in Residence Chris Williams. Williams, a versatile musician and descendent of the Wakka Wakka people entered to the side of the auditorium filling the concert hall with the dawn chatter of the butcher bird combined with rhythmic flicking and the drone of the didgeridoo. The screaming glissando of the cello accompanied by oboe and strings created a subliminal lullaby that delved into a forested fantasy. Twist's film soundtrack experience was evident, as the music ebbed and flowed to the rhythm of the rainforest. HOTA LYRICAL LANDSCAPES: DARKNESS AND LIGHT - October 2 & 3, 2021

Music Meets Art: Southern Cross Soloists presented a stunning program of chamber music inspired by the life and works of Australia's greatest living artist, William Robinson AO.



The program traced William's love of music, with a particularly focus on the piano, with works by Bach, Chopin and Rachmaninov performed by Southern Cross Soloists (SXS) and SXS Artist in Residence, Wakka Wakka didgeridoo soloist Chris Williams.

In a program that explored the nexus between music and art, the highlight was the performance of the new work by Gold Coast/Hollywood based film composer, Joseph Twist inspired by William Robinson's Creation series.

The new composition The Ancient Rainforest brought alive visions of the Gondwana rainforest of the Springbrook National Park.

August performance: O'Boyle Didgeridoo Concerto

"The first half of this digital concert began with the Southern Cross Soloists performing the new chamber version of Sean O'Boyle's Didgeridoo Concerto: Earth, Wind, Water, Fire, originally written for William Barton.

I reviewed them playing a pair of movements from this version late last year, and was very impressed at the way that the intense power of the orchestral original came across, even reduced down to violin, cello, oboe, piano, and didgeridoo soloist. Here, hearing the full four movements back-to-back showcased a remarkable evolution of an already excellent piece, and, now that there's an alternative version that doesn't require a full symphony orchestra, one that I hope will be performed more often.

The first movement Earth begins with ominous figurations from the strings and piano before Tania Frazer's oboe steps forward, wrapping around motifs from the piano, later echoed and developed by Chris Williams' didgeridoo. Wind gives Williams a echoing and droning ostinato which the ensemble builds from rhythmically, with particularly impressive ensemble work ensuring clarity. Water brought Frazer's oboe to the forefront in an aching melody later supported by the didgeridoo, before the entrance of stuttering rhythms in the fourth movement Fire. Shifting into a head-banging groove led by Williams' didgeridoo, this last movement truly showcased the extraordinary range of colours, sounds, and textures that such a quintessentially Australian instrument is capable of." NEXT GEN 2021

The SXS Next Gen Artists program offers mentoring, professional development and performance opportunities to outstanding young musicians at the cusp of their professional careers. Providing a bridge between tertiary study and a professional music career, it offers the artists opportunities to be mentored by and perform alongside leading soloists, and to also develop their skills in curating and delivering their own concert series which offers these outstanding young talented musicians invaluable professional experience, networking, exposure and skills development opportunities.

Since 2019, the Next Gen program has annually presented the SXS Kenmore Concert Series. This ongoing initiative provides 360-degree career training for our emerging artists to curate, self-manage and perform chamber music concerts at the new Kenmore Churches of Christ Auditorium, passing on invaluable insights into running a professional chamber music ensemble. This series has also nurtured a new audience base in the western suburbs, providing meaningful community engagement in an area where there is limited professional live concerts for older generations or those with accessibility needs.

The SXS Next Gen Artists perform to over 900 patrons annually.

On Saturday the 20th and 27th of November,
2021 at 3pm, the Next Gen young artists performed a
delightful 60-minute programme of music they love,
in the spectacular acoustics of St Andrew's Uniting
Church in Brisbane's CBD. Audiences were at

BANGALOW MUSIC FESTIVAL 2021





Despite postponing the 19th Bangalow Music Festival to 2022, we held successful launches in Brisbane at the Avid Reader Book Store and in Bangalow, hosted by John Griffiths and ADFAS Byron Bay. Tania and Jonathan were joined by the 2021 SXS Next Gen Artists for these performances.

'Maps and Journeys: the world's first astronomers' was workshopped in June and July. Originally set to premiere at the 2021 Bangalow Music Festival, this has now been postponed to the 2022 Festival. The program explores the rich astronomical traditions and extraordinary navigational abilities of our First Nations people over the past 65,000 years, a culture of astronomical traditions believed by experts to be the oldest in the world. The project features new works by First Nations composers Brenda Gifford and Eric Avery, working alongside didgeridoo soloist Chris Williams (Wakka Wakka people), Actor/writer Paula Nazarski (Ngugi Woman from North Stradbroke Island), composer Sean O'Boyle, SXS AD Tania Frazer and SXS musicians and Next Gen artists.

Sean O'Boyle AM

Awarded the Order of Australia in 2015 for services to music, Sean's compositions have been performed and/or recorded by all the major Australian orchestras. European Orchestras include; Berlin Philharmonic, Orchestre Symphonique Divertimento, Royal Philharmonic Orchestra, BBC Concert Orchestra, Belgrade Philharmonic Orchestra, and by North American orchestras including the Dallas, Atlanta, Tacoma, Lexington, Fort Worth Symphony Orchestras and the Cincinnati Pops Orchestra. Sean has written and produced music for more than 150 CDs recorded in collaboration with the Australian Broadcasting Corporation,

numerous television shows, sporting events and for film. Sean is proud of his 25-year relationship with the Southern Cross Soloists.



Leah Curtis

Leah Curtis scored the acclaimed Sundance thriller 'Killing Ground', praised as a "first rate score" (Variety). Awarded a Fulbright, and former visiting film composer at USC SMPTV, her music has received nominations from APRA, seven from the HMMA, with wins for Kuwaiti war film 'To Rest in Peace' and historical epic 'Exitus Roma', across best score and song. Her work has been featured in marquee festivals in Dubai, Cannes, New York and at the Aspen Music Festival where she studied over a summer with Oscar winning composer John Corigliano

(*The Red Violin*). She works out of Los Angeles and internationally, writing, orchestrating and recording music for international cinema and the concert hall.



Matthew Dewey

Matthew Dewey is a composer and music director based in Sydney and Hobart in Australia. He composes powerful, lyrical music for the concert hall, the theatre and for film. His first chamber opera was written and staged when he was just 18 and at the age of 24, his first symphony and first orchestral suite were recorded in Moscow by the Russian Philharmonic Orchestra. In addition to his work as a freelance composer,

Matthew is the music director of Australia's national classical music radio network, ABC Classic FM. Matthew's compositions have been commissioned and perform Chatterton" (2005); and released two full albums to date.



2021-2024 Digital Strategy

The SXS Digital project established a substantial base for cultivating further ongoing digital activities with income generating and increased branding potential for SXS.

Substantial infrastructure updates were developed with ongoing benefits to the company included: Updating the website; increasing online capabilities including publishing software; distribution platform subscriptions; Online work and meeting subscriptions (eg Zoom), technical equipment for recording and editing digital content and upskilling the management team in IT and the use of equipment.

In house recording capabilities and ongoing partnerships with Melbourne Digital Concert Hall were established. Live performance footage became part of a new regional hybrid touring model for SXS as we developed a hybrid live/digital regional concert tour to offer flexibility to aged care residents to either view live or from private rooms in regional Qld aged care homes through our partnership with Qld Churches of Christ Aged Care.

SXS core artists recorded solo and small group recitals for online and streaming distribution, including world premieres of new Australian works for online distribution and cross marketing opportunities for composers.

SXS Digital: a multi-faceted digital platform offering unique and relevant content and value added experiences to the Qld community. SXS Digital is a responsive approach to the current restrictions that will increase our audience and community engagement whilst building strong fiscal foundations long term. The platform will offer high quality performance, educational and human interest content with the capacity for future expansion, and increased employment to arts professionals.

Touring a hybrid digital presentation throughout regional Queensland in partnership with Churches of Christ (CoC) enabled us to reach new audiences in remote areas which, during the height of the COVID pandemic, would not have been physically or fiscally viable otherwise. The true nature of survival via digital means was felt significantly during this project. Through this initiative, SXS was actually able to connect with more audiences through the streaming option than through the traditional concert/regional touring format. The expense to both SXS and CoC was greatly reduced through the hybrid presentation format and was distributed to a wider network, which we intend to build on in the next few years.

Through our own in-house streaming of performances as well as our partnership with Melbourne Digital Concert hall (MDCH), SXS substantially increased its national and international presence. These initiatives and partnerships will be continued in 2022 with further streamed performances as well as continuing our behind the scenes, podcast-style video interviews which have also appealed to a national and international audience.

SXS's Didgeridoo Composers Workshop videos are aimed at a national and international audience, and are strategically primed to have a long-term correlation with our new SXS Didgeridoo Commissioning Project 2022- 2032. This new initiative is committed to building a new canon of Australian chamber music works that showcase the didgeridoo with an unmistakably quintessentially Australian essence. Commissioning three works per year, the canon will consist of 30 new works by the time Brisbane takes the world stage to host the 2032 Olympic Games.

Southern Cross Soloists have been able to activate our online presence, engaging with a broader audience geographically (our website and social media analytics report interest not only from across Australia but has raised our profile and view count internationally), and increasing our reach to a younger audience through online content and digital media engagement as well as through promoting our SXS Next Gen Artists through these expanded channels.

Within Qld, SXS was able to maintain our audience engagement and even create substantial growth at QPAC through our improved online marketing channels, improved website and social media platforms as a direct result of the SXS Digital initiative.
